In determining relationships we must begin somewhere; there must be a fixed center against which everything else is measured. Such a center is God. He is the living God. He never changes.



In the Bible the creator of heaven and earth is called "God" and "The Lord." But what is God like? What kind of God is He? Thankfully, God has revealed Himself through nature, the Bible and His Son. God's self-revelation makes it possible for us to know Him. Here are some things God has revealed as being true of Himself:



Eternal Creator

God has always existed and always will exist. He is self-sufficient and does not depend upon anyone or anything.

The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by hands. And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything, because he himself gives all men life and breath and everything else.

Unique

There is only one true God.

I am the LORD, and there is no other; apart from me there is no God. I will strengthen you, though you have not acknowledged me, so that from the rising of the sun to the place of its setting men may know there is none besides me.

The Bible

The Bible is a collection of writings (also called the Scripture and God's Word).

The Bible consists of 66 different books. The Bible was written by many different writers and primarily in two languages — Hebrew and Greek. It has been translated into over 400 languages. The writers were of many social ranks — rich, poor, kings, farmers, fishermen, priests, tax-collectors, tentmakers, educated, uneducated, Jews and non-Jews. The writers were mostly unknown to each other. The Bible was written over a space of 1600 years.

The Bible deals with one subject — man's salvation — how mankind can be reunited with God. It is divided into two parts — Old Testament and New Testament. Find the division of the Old and New Testaments in your Bible. The word *testament* means

covenant. A covenant is a mutual and total commitment between two people. The old covenant was established through Moses (a Jewish leader who lived about 1500 BC) and was based on the Ten Commandments (a list of 10 laws that God gave the Jewish people in the time of Moses). The new covenant is established through Jesus and is based on God's grace (undeserved forgiveness toward people).

Each book of the Bible is divided into chapters and verses. These divisions were introduced in the 13th and 16th centuries. Look at the first book of the Bible, Genesis. The big numbers are the chapter divisions. The little numbers are the verse divisions. This system allows people to easily find any sentence in the Bible.

The Bible originated with God. We know God's mind because He has spoken. Il Timothy 3:16 says, "All Scripture is God-breathed." This means that the Bible came from God's mouth. He spoke it and men wrote down what He said. God would be a stranger to us if He had not spoken. Behind every word that anybody speaks stands the person who speaks it. God's Word has authority because of who He is. The Bible is more than

a book that was once written; it is a voice that is now speaking.

The Bible is God's autobiography. It is God's revelation about Himself. To understand it we must read the Scriptures as God's revelation, not as a religious Wikipedia or text book. God's primary goal is to help us know Him. The Bible explains who God is, what God values and how God works. It reveals that God is the Creator, Savior and Judge of all the earth.

The Bible is personal. The scriptures were designed to enter our hearts and form

us into people who reflect God's likeness. The greatest portion of God's Word is devoted to persuading people to change their ways and live as God wants. In order to learn to obey God we must approach the Bible with an open mind and desire to do what God says.

The Bible is relevant to every culture and in every time period; it will never become obsolete. Everything in the Scriptures is for you. It is a living message for the contemporary world. The Bible is universal. It is a message for all people everywhere. In the Bible we don't just learn ideas, but see Jesus Himself.



Satan is the great enemy of God and man.

In the Bible, Satan is often called the devil. Other titles for Satan include: the evil one, the father of lies, a murderer and the tempter. The origin of Satan is uncertain, but the Bible implies that he was once an angel who was condemned because of his ambitious pride and rebellion against God. (Isaiah 14:12-15) In his fall, Satan drew other evil angels with him. These angels that followed Satan are called demons.





Satan, the Devil

Satan is engaged in a worldwide struggle against God and all goodness. He is ever-seeking to defeat God's plans and try to get people to do wrong. His primary method is deception. He tries to deceive people into believing that God's ways are not the best for them. The Bible says that he is a spiritual being, very intelligent, very powerful, and totally evil. Even though Satan is not all-powerful as God, he is powerful. Jesus believed in his existence and warned of his power and influence.



Jesus talked with the devil. Jesus was led by the Spirit in the desert, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. The devil said to him "If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to become bread." Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man does not live on bread alone."



Satan is real. Satan is most deceptive when he persuades people that he does not exist. Satan tries to deceive people into thinking that he is good. Satan himself masquerades as an angel of light.

II CORINTHIANS 11:14



The devil is the enemy of all followers of Jesus. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour.

I PETER 5:8



God is the ultimate authority in the universe, not the devil. Satan's doom is certain. Satan is a defeated enemy. Jesus promised that eternal fire is prepared for the devil and his angels. And the devil who deceived them was thrown into the lake of burning fire ...and will be tormented day and night forever and ever.

Sin

God made man sinless. Man was created to reflect God's perfect likeness. Today man does not always reflect God's likeness. The Bible calls this condition sin. All people have sinned; it is a universal spiritual condition. Only Jesus is without sin. Sin is any thought, word or action that falls short of reflecting God's likeness. Scripture describes sin several different ways:

- ■Failing to live up to God's standards
- ■Doing what is morally wrong by lying, cheating, stealing
- ■Perverting what is good
- Disregarding a known boundary and doing what is forbidden
- ■Neglecting to carry out clear instructions from God

Sin causes humans to live as if they are accountable to no one. Sin is the decision to live life away from God rather than toward Him. Sin is opposed to God. We sin when we do not submit to the rule of God. We sin when we place ourselves in charge of our lives. God designed us to love Him first. Sin puts our will before God. The effect of sin is always negative.

Sin is...

Congenital: (from birth)
Sin is an inherited spiritual disease.
We are born with its infection in our nature. It is present at birth.

Addictive:

Sin is drug-like. It's easy to get hooked and hard to break free.

Alienating: (separating)
Sin cuts us off from God and creates conflict with others.

Destructive:

Sin destroys our conscience, self-worth and reputation.

Enslaving:

Sin captures and imprisons. 'Slave' describes many people. Habitual sin makes people its slave.

Sin is like putting your hand in a bucket of glue and then trying to wipe it clean. Everything you touch becomes sticky and it's impossible to get totally clean. Sin has created an unloving world. We all share some responsibility for the sin that is in the world today.

The solution for our condition is to discover a way to deal with sin and get God back into our lives. Thankfully, God loved us and sent His Son Jesus to provide us with such a solution. Jesus Christ died for our sins. Through His death on the cross, our sins are forgiven.

Followers of Jesus are forgiven for their sins. They also can overcome the devil's influence.



Resist the devil and he will flee from you.

The search to find

God always begins with Jesus. 1/1/hy?

Because if Jesus is not who he said he was, and if he did not do what he said he had come to do, the foundation of Christianity would collapse.

The evidence about Jesus is contained in the New Testament. *The evidence is three-fold:* His claims, His character, and His resurrection.



Jesus His Claims

Jesus' teaching was centered on Himself; who he was, what he was like and what he could do. **Here are** the Claims of Christ:

> (What do each one of these mean?)

I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never go hungry, and he who believes in me will never be thirsty.

This means that Jesus is...

I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life.

This means that Jesus is...

I tell you the truth, before Abraham was born, I am.


JOHN 8:58

This means that Jesus is...

I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved.

JOHN 10:9

This means that Jesus is...



I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.

JOHN 10:11

This means that Jesus is...

I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live even though he dies.

JOHN 11:25

This means that Jesus is...

I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

JOHN 14:6

This means that Jesus is...

I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing.

JOHN 15:5

This means that Jesus is...

You are right in saying I am a king. In fact, for this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me.

This means that Jesus is...

Jesus demonstrated that he was equal with God by his

miracles:

The miracles I do in my father's name speak for me, but you do not believe because you are not my sheep. My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. 



Conclusion:

Many people today believe that Jesus was a great teacher, but not the Son of God. If Jesus' claims were false he could not be a great teacher. If his claims were false, he was either an imposter or completely crazy. If his claims were true, then he is the Lord and deserves our allegiance.









Why is it important for a person's character to be consistent with his claims? Who we say we are must be aligned with the way we live.

Even though
Jesus' character does
not prove that his
claims are true,
it strongly confirms
them. Both Jesus' claims
and his character were
unique. Jesus was
in a moral category
by himself. In regards
to sin, he was not
like others. He was
without sin. That

makes him

supernatural.

The evidence for Jesus' sinless-ness can be summarized under the following four headings:

Jesus *His Character*

What Jesus Did

Jesus' actions were perfect — without fault. In addition to teaching about God, Jesus met many physical needs by feeding the hungry and healing the sick. Regardless of status, He compassionately accepted and served all people.

A man with leprosy came and knelt before him and said, "Lord, if you are willing, you can make me clean." Jesus reached out his hand and touched the man. "I am willing," he said. "Be clean!" Immediately he was cured of his leprosy.

MATTHEW 8:2-3

While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and "sinners" came and ate with him and his disciples.

MATTHEW 9:10

Then little children were brought to Jesus to him to place his hands on them and pray for them. But the disciples rebuked those who brought them.

Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."

MATTHEW 19:13-15

What Jesus' Friends Said

Peter describes Jesus as a lamb without blemish (imperfection); Jesus committed no sin; no deceit was found on his lips.

What Jesus' Enemies Said

His enemies accused him of ■ blasphemy (speaking against God) ■ evil associations ■ a frivolous view of religion (taking religious things lightly, not seriously)

■ breaking worship day traditions

Yet his enemies were not able to say anything against his claims and character. Pilate and Herod (Roman officials) said that they could find no fault in Jesus.

Pilate called together the chief priests, the rulers, and the people, and said to them, "You brought me this man as one who was inciting the people to rebellion. I have examined him in your presence and have found no basis for your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us; as you can see, he has done nothing to deserve death."





The women were greatly surprised to discover that the body of Jesus had disappeared. The tomb was empty. Here are some explanations for the missing body:

■ The women went to the wrong tomb ■ Jesus wasn't really dead — just unconscious ■ Thieves stole the body ■ The disciples removed the body ■ The Roman or Jewish authorities took the body. ■ Jesus rose from the dead.

There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. The angel said to the women, "Don't be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said."

"You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. *See the place where they*

They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus.

The Grave-Clothes were **Undisturbed**

The body of Jesus was gone, but the grave-clothes were not.

Simon Peter arrived and went into the tomb. He saw the strips of cloth that had been around Jesus' head. The cloth was folded up by itself, separate from the linen.

The Lord was Seen

Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Peter, and then to the Twelve. After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, and last of all he appeared to me (Paul) also.

The Lord's Followers were Changed

The disciples were changed from cowards to bold witnesses in a remarkably short time. Here are two of many scripture examples...

They called the apostles in and had them flogged (beaten with whips). The apostles left the Sanhedrin (Jewish court), rejoicing because they had been counted worthy of suffering disgrace for the Name (of Jesus).

When he (Saul) came to Jerusalem, he tried to join the disciples, but they were afraid of him, not believing that he really was a disciple. But Barnabas took him and brought him to the apostles. 




